To the Congregation of Laurel Presbyterian Church,

I write this epistle to y'all with a heavy, but joyful heart, as my time in Richmond ends. Looking back, I am surprised to realize that half of my time at Union Presbyterian Seminary has been spent worshiping with you, serving with you, and loving with you. I have gained so much insight and wisdom from our conversations, your words of encouragement, and the Spirit's call to teach and preach to such a special congregation. I hope you have heard me say it often that Laurel is special. There is a reason that small churches are often saddled with stereotypes. Small churches can be boring. Small churches can simply be tending to their

cemeteries. Sure, small churches can feel like a family, but in plenty of congregations, newcomers can feel like uninvited strangers at the dinner table. None of this can be said for Laurel.

I recently learned that as we age, humans lose their sense of "thirst." Of course, we obviously need to drink water – as much as possible! – but for some reason or another, the further we stretch in our adulthood, doctors encourage us to be more conscientious about our water consumption, lest we face the consequences of dehydration. And the consequences of dehydration are serious. Symptoms can simply be uncomfortable experiences, like dry mouth or struggling to find the right words, or worse: kidney failure and death. In its own way, this is what can happen to people entrenched in a house of worship that does not fill their cup, and it's more common of an experience than you might imagine. People stop finding reason to participate; they see no value in facilitating a newsletter, mowing the lawn, adorning the sanctuary, flipping pancakes, or visiting students and homebound members. This happens because they forget to drink it all in. They do not receive the reminders of the juicy fruits which spill forth from Laurel's love (Matt 7:16).

They do not recognize the power of the Spirit which should arrive daily from a church's commitment to the gospel. They do not recognize the power of the Spirit breathing life into the proclamation of God's word: through the sermon and the choir and the liturgists. They do not feel the incredible expression of communion, taken together, as a body of believers. They do not understand why weekly gatherings like Sunday School and Beloved fundamentally change the ways Christians choose joy and humility and justice for the world-at-large. They do not understand the mystery that can be found by intentional love (1 Peter 5) and collective siblinghood. But I understand. I get it. I get it because Laurel gives it. When you live it out, people feel it in their bones; like God's love, it feels inescapable. And you never ever want to forget about it.

So, as I discern my first call to be an installed Minister of the Word and Sacrament, Laurel is my constant reminder to drink up the water of life and to ensure that it flows freely in whatever congregation comes calling. And because of my experience here, I know that I will not be the fount of Spirit, but instead a man honored enough to share God's love with all who choose.

Each one of you touched Sarah's and my hearts in your own way. Thanks to the leadership of the Vision Task Force and Reverend Cherry, the Spirit has developed my confidence. I hope you understand how rare of a feat this is, in a truly Secular Age. Listen to the Spirit about the ways you have changed lives. By continuing to tend to your church, you will not be thirsty. You will always find your way back to the Source.



We are awaiting results from the state on the status of Gingerbread Cottage water testing.

The Gingerbread Contract for 2025-26 is still in process.

Gingerbread has submitted a lengthy list of requested repairs and improvements. The next meeting of this team will focus on this list.

The Henrico County Fire Marshall did a reinspection, and all violations have been corrected.

Fire Equipment Company inspected our fire extinguishers and serviced one which needed recharging.

Several routine maintenance items have been repaired by Wayne Alvis and Marshall Chamberlayne. We had water that had collected from a downpour by the door by the choir loft. The water seeped in around the air conditioner. Marshall replaced wood to prevent future water intrusion. We will purchase plastic piping to divert water away from this entrance.

It has been recommended that Laurel consider leasing cell tower space. More research is needed before an informed decision can be made.


