Communion: The Gathering of the People Around Love

I am very excited to share that starting in October, we are moving to serving communion twice a month. This came out of a Vision Task Force meeting where a member shared how the simple act of receiving the tangible gifts of "bread and wine," at an important inflection point in her life, was a "lifeline" for receiving God's Love. For her, worship had become jumbled words that did not touch her soul. Yet, taking the concrete gifts of Christ into her body, was transforming. The Session, after consulting with the Worship and Education (WE) Team, thought this was a significant form of grace that we could incorporate into our collective lives. We know there are times in our lives when words just seem to come at us and do not change us. Nate Bargatze, the comedian, who lives with dyslexia, said opening a book was just overwhelming — "there were so many words!" There are many reasons why words "spoken" and "read" cannot reach our hearts. But God's love is meant to mold us, to change us, to meet us where we are, and we hope that by

providing an additional way to receive this love, it will meet us where we are as a congregation.

At the heart of it, I love that communion is a reminder that we share in something larger than ourselves. A reminder that we belong to God and to one another. It is a reminder that we participate in Love itself, which transcends our individual points of view and yet draws us closer to each other. It is a reminder that each one of us is needed to be this Body of Christ. Each one of us has a gift from God, for the people of God. Last month, we talked about coming back into this Body this fall with fresh eyes and energy to look at our lives and what God was speaking through them. How are we enlivened? Where is God asking us to serve? Where might we try something out? We live in a highly charged time when it is so easy to become consumed by the fragments of our culture, rather than live from our identity in God. Communion unites us at the core. It tells us who we are as God's beloved ones. It reminds us that God is at work bringing goodness to the worldand not just through us. And through communion, it calls us back into the life of the Body as a spiritual touchpoint for everything we do. It brings us into something larger than what happened in the world this day. It connects us with each other, where we are seen, valued, and honored because all of us are seen, valued, and honored by our Creator. The inclination to dismiss "the other" for bad behavior is real, but that is not what Jesus showed us. He included and forgave the other, and we are asked to imitate God in doing likewise. And it reminds us that all of us are needed "to be" the kingdom from all our neurodivergent "otherness" so that we might inhabit that day when the "leopard lies down with the kid, and a little child leads them (Isaiah 11:6-7)." We keep our eyes on this kingdom—and each time we come together to worship, each time we express our gifts from God, each time we share in communion, we participate in the goodness of Love that makes room for all of our gifts. Laurel is a wonderful place to discover our calling and to connect to this bigger, always bigger vision of God's love making itself known to us and through us. So, we might embody the change that God is bringing about on earth through us.

We anticipate serving communion on the 1st and 3rd Sundays of the month, with modifications for Christmas Eve and my schedule. We hope to provide this concrete way to receive God's Love for the next few months and then re-evaluate it in February. Please let us know how you feel about incorporating this spiritual practice into our corporate life. We are grateful for the bread provided by Janice Berger (often homemade) and Michael Henderson. Linda Patterson has agreed to cut the bread into cubes to make it more easily accessible and hygienic. And as we always do, we will offer the all-in-one cups. In addition, we will continue to try out new ways of coming to the table and sharing the elements, as we did with our "outdoor" worship services this summer.

This month, we will celebrate communion on both October 5, which is World Communion Sunday, and October 19th. We hope this will feed our spirits and enliven our communion, as this Body of Christ, whether at home or in person. May you know concretely how much you are loved and good.

TAX-ADVANTAGED GIVING...

Here is some food for thought in advance of our annual Stewardship campaign.

Taxes help us support our community needs. But did you know that there are two simple ways that you can make pre-tax donations to Laurel and other qualified organizations that could, if you choose, enable you to give a bit more than you thought might be possible?

If you receive distributions from a Traditional Individual Retirement Account (IRA) and are at least 70 ½ years of age, you are likely eligible to make pre-tax contributions directly from your account to Laurel and other qualified organizations using a Qualified Charitable Distribution, also known as a QCD. And if you are receiving Required Minimum Distributions (RMDs), a QCD you make can be applied to that RMD.

If you have a brokerage account containing stocks and various other fund instruments that you accumulated over the years, you may be eligible to create a Donor Advised Fund (DAF) that allows you to avoid paying capital gains taxes by donating appreciated stocks to a DAF and directing them as donations to Laurel and other qualified organizations.

Both of these options are fairly simple to put into place, so if you think one might fit into your circumstances, contact your account representative for further guidance.

New Business

Awnings at Gingerbread entrance and fellowship hall are faded. Gingerbread attempted to clean the awning to no avail. The team authorized Capital Awning Company to prepare a price quote to replace the two awnings.

GingerBread asked if we would share the expense to have tile flooring stripped and waxed. The team felt that was reasonable and will request the invoice for this service.

Southeast Connections a vendor for the gas service has marked gas service to everyone along Staples Mill Road – Pete has been monitoring this issue.

We will launch the Stewardship campaign in November.

Old Business

The Vision Task Force asked S & P to research the issue of having a cell phone tower on our property. This is not a straightforward process and there are a number of concerns, such as:

Should we enter into a contract which is generally 50 years?

The vendor needs 24-hour access.

The provider can sublet to multiple other providers.

There are zoning concerns, and our neighbors most likely will oppose this issue.

There are concerns about health risks such as radiofrequency and radiation exposure.

There was discussion about having an ADA compliant bathroom. Constructing a new bathroom is cost prohibitive. The notion of converting the pastor's bathroom was discussed and to modify this area has its challenges. We would have to relocate the infrastructure for the fire alarm system, which would be difficult and pricey. The team is recommending that we convert either the men's or ladies' room for this need and obtain price quotes for this conversion.
